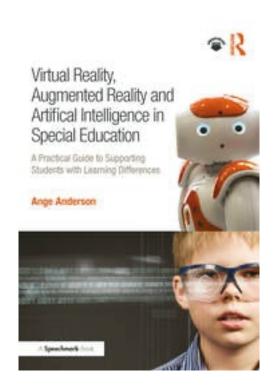

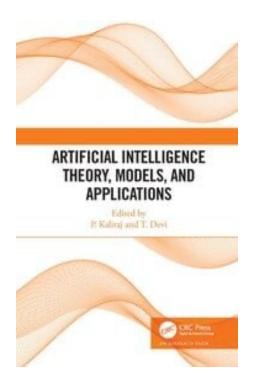

ABSTRACT

Interest in implementing artificial intelligence (AI)-based software in the public sector is growing. First implementations and research in individual public services have already been carried out; however, a better understanding of citizens' acceptance of this technology is missing in the public sector, as insights from the private sector cannot be transferred directly. For this purpose, we conduct policy-capturing experiments to analyze AI's acceptance in six representative scenarios. Based on behavioral reasoning theory, we gather evidence from 329 participants. The results show that AI solutions in general public services are preferred over those provided by humans, but specific services are still a human domain. Further analyses show that the major drivers toward acceptance are the reasons against AI. The results contribute to understanding of when and why AI is accepted in public services. Public administration can use the results to identify AI-based software to invest in and communicate their usage to perceive such investments' high acceptance rates.

Interest in the potential of artificial intelligence (AI) is not only evident in the private sector but also growing rapidly in the public sector (e.g. Lindgren, Madsen, Hofmann, & Melin, 2019; Rosemann, Becker, & Chasin, 2020). The introduction of AI in organizations promises greater efficiency and higher-quality services (Sun & Medaglia, 2019). How-ever, although there is already much research on AI in general, little attention has been paid to AI in the public sector (Sun & Medaglia, 2019). Findings — Based on previous literature, the paper highlights the accountability gaps that AI can bring about and the possible countermeasures. The introduction of AI algorithms in public services modifies the chain of responsibility. Originality/value — The findings of the paper shed new light and perspective on how public service accountability in AI should be considered and addressed. Purpose — With the development of information technology (IT), governments around the globe are using state-of-the-art. IT interfaces to implement the so-called 3E's in public service delivery, that is, economy, efficiency and effectiveness. Two of these IT interfaces relate to Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Internet of Things (IoT). While AI focuses on providing a "human" garb for computing devices, thereby making them "intelligent" devices, IoT relies on interfaces between sensors and the environment to make "intelligent" devices, Recently, the convergence of AI and IoT – also referred to as Artificial Intelligence of Things (AIoT) – is seen as a real opportunity to refurbish the public service delivery formats. However, there is limited understanding as to how AIoT – in the improvise integral of our bills. how AloT could contribute to the improvisation of public service delivery. This study aims to create a modular

framework for AIoT in addition to highlighting the drivers and barriers for its integration in the public sector.

Design/methodology/approach – This descriptive-explanatory study takes a qualitative approach. Introduction

Information technology (IT) interfaces have found applications across a diverse set of sectors public and private. The public sector is tapping IT interfaces to improvise its administrative activities besides bringing about the economy, efficiency and effectiveness in public service delivery. Of late, with the emergence of the novel techniques and tools in IT like Artificial Intelligence (AI), which is better defined in terms of the "human" capabilities of the computer systems, and the Internet of Things (IoT), which is defined as the environment-computer interaction through sensors, the public sector is poised to adopt these state-of-the-art IT interfaces, especially the convergence of Al and IoT or what is better termed as the Artificial Intelligence of Things (AloT). Extant literature on the AloT focuses on the technical dimensions of AloT (Ullah et al., 2022; Wang et al., 2021a, 2021b; Xu et al., 2021; Yu et al., 2022) while discounting the possible implications for the different economic and social sectors. Artificial Intelligence (AI) has been suggested to have transformative potential for public sector organizations through enabling increased productivity and novel ways to deliver public services. In order to materialize the transformative potential of AI, public sector operations need to successfully assimilate AI in their operational activities. However, AI assimilation in the public sector appears to be fragmented and lagging the private sector, and the phenomena has really limited attention from academic research community. To address this gap, we adopt the case study approach to explore three Suadi-Arabian public sector organizations and analyze the results using the attention-based view of the organization (ABV) as the theoretical lens. This study elucidates the challenges related AI assimilation in public sector in terms of how organizational attention is focused situated and distributed during the assimilation process. The findings reveal a re-enforcing relationship between the situated attention and structural distribution of attention that can accelerate the successful assimilation of AI in public sector organizations.

In a recent interview with the CEO of Norges Bank Investment Management, Elon Musk, CEO of Tesla, said artificial intelligence may become smarter than any human by the end of next year.

It is true that AI breakthroughs achieved over the past 18 months, including video generation tools and chatbots, have accelerated the development of AI. The Financial Times reported that Musk actually predicted last year that humans will "fully" achieve general artificial intelligence by 2029. Musk has long been optimistic about AI development, believing it is so powerful that it can beat the most capable human in any field.

However rapid its development, AI needs policy, resources and technological support. Yet its cultivation in many fields now lacks this kind of support. Cooperation among councooperation is subject to geopolitics and other restrictive factors, hindering the smooth development of AI. At the same time, AI development is also limited by some cultural factors, such as ChatGPT's answers being more in line with the Western discourse, which means the development of AI with a single national power may increase the imbalance of global AI development. All this calls for precise connection between capital and the market, and extensive international cooperation for AI development.

The fast development of AI in

The fast development of AI in recent years has reduced production costs and improved production efficiency, opening the door to new business formats in multiple areas. Despite bringing in efficiency, the use of artificial intelligence is also fraught with problems and risks. The technology continues to

vacy and so on, leading to increased calls for the formation of moral boundaries and legal norms applicable to this new technology.

According to experts, the power consumed by human brains is much lower than the power lost to artificial intelligence operation, and there is still a gap between the levels of artificial intelligence and human intelligence. However, from a long-term perspective, they believe that artificial intelligence, which now has many shortcomings compared with the human brain, may eventually surpass human intelligence supported by algorithms and data, depending on how some hardware and software such as chips and algorithms develop.

The era of artificial intelligence is an era of risks and opportunities, and the uncertainty brought by this technology to human society may

Canada's federal government has used artificial intelligence in nearly 300 projects and initiatives, new research has found - including to help predict the outcome of tax cases, sort temporary visa applications and promote diversity in hiring. Joanna Redden, an associate professor at Western University, pieced

together the database using new reports, documents tabled in Parliament and access-to-information requests. Of the 303 automated tools in the

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada said two pilot projects from 2018 to help officers triage temporary resident visa applications have become permanent. The department uses "artificial intelligence tools to sort applications and determine positive eligibility."

The register also says the department employs AI to review study permit applications by people from other countries, though a spokesperson said it does not use Al for "final decision-making."

The department's automated systems can't reject an application or recommend a rejection, the spokesperson said.

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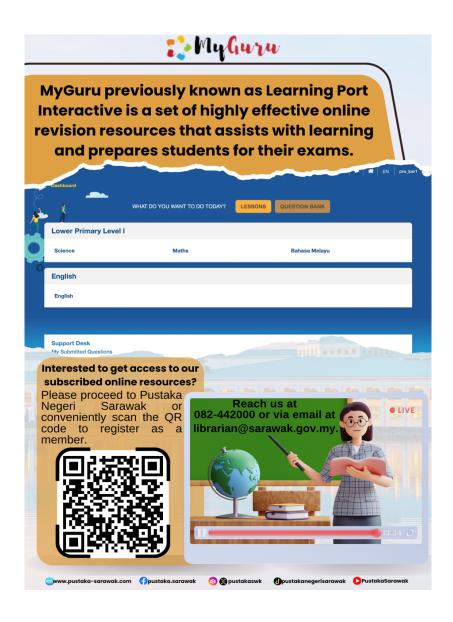
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
